Civics and Citizenship

It's Not Ok To Be Away

Attending school on a regular basis is vital for all students in Prep to Grade 6 so that they can access all they need to learn throughout their 7 years of primary schooling. This attendance is related to curriculum in that if the students have a high absence rate, their immersion in the curriculum is severely reduced. Please read the information below with regards to absence rates and consider the number of days your child has absent from school:

The wider school community, parents and students need to fully understand the impact of missing too many school days. If a student has a day off, once a fortnight, this would add up to 20 days in a school year (approximately 40 weeks in a school year). 20 days is the same as missing a tenth of a school year.

This would be equal to missing a year of schooling up to Year 10.

A key message that needs to be embraced by schools, parents, and the wider community is that "It's Not OK to be Away". The 'fallout' of poor attendance is very real. These students will be at risk of not achieving their potential and therefore limit their life choices.

Also, other real consequences are:

- Social isolation
- Will have gaps in their learning of knowledge and basic concepts
- May feel insecure in the school environment
- More likely to leave school early
- Could lead to school refusal further in their education
- May place themselves at risk of harm while absent

When you consider the above, schools, parents and the wider community need to work in partnership with each other to ensure students enjoy school success and as a consequence more enriching life choices. We appreciate that there are times when students are ill, but we are outlining the importance of those other times that absences occur.

IT'S NOT OK TO BE AWAY!

How many days of school has your child missed?

10 days or less off per year 95% or above -Awesome attendance

11-20 days

This is poor attendance.

A child with this attendance rate could miss up to 2 years of schooling between Kindergarten and Year 10.

20+ days

This is concerning attendance.

A child with this attendance rate could miss up to $2\frac{1}{4}$ years of schooling between Kindergarten and Year 10.

PARLIAMENT VISITS ROSEDALE PRIMARY



Darren Chester attended Rosedale Primary to receive letters our school leaders have written in support of the Pump Track.



During a recent visit to parliament Matthew gave a speech regarding the proposed Pump Track. Matthew's speech to parliament was filmed and used as an entry for the Parliamentary Prize. The Parliament Prize is an annual competition delivered by the Victorian parliament that gives students an opportunity to talk about issues that are important to them. Students are asked to consider what they would say to parliament if they were an MP and record their own 90-second Member's Statement video.

"Thanks to the speaker, I rise to inform you of the Rosedale pump track... The federal or local government has paid only half for the pump track, why would they only pay half? The community needs a pump track and if they don't get one, they will protest. Seaspray has only 328 people, and it was paid fully. And Rosedale has 1993 people and were only paying half? ridiculous for such a small town and if we pay fully, they would be absolutely elated to see a pump track in their own town! The people of this small town want the pump track so badly that they would depression if it was cancelled, it would take a lot of money paying for therapy because of this. So, if you pay fully, not only people will save money from driving their cars less to get to other towns that have one, but also from therapy because people will get depression if we don't pay fully. About 95% of people in Rosedale that own bikes will be ecstatic when they will see it and it won't cost us much so why wouldn't we give a pump track to these people? How about we also pay half or negotiate for the part of government that paid half to make them pay full? Thanks for letting me speak about this Speaker."


